Eleven hungry members each fixed a luscious food item to bring along with them to the meeting. The night was bitterly cold, but we had a great time eating, despite the frigid evening. 1997's Winter Training Rides, hosted by David, Bill, Marcia, and Matt, began. There was an unofficial SVBC Super Bowl ride, climbing Reddish Knob in the snow. The Club made its way onto the cyberspace highway thanks to By February, the cool arctic weather descended on the valley, snowing 12" on February 8. Yet, a few of us made it to the

Even though the weather turned chilly, the May meeting began with the first pre-meeting ride. addition, the monthly meeting moved to Luigi's, which became the location for the remaining meetings held in 1997. May was also noted as National Bike Month. One thing that I seem to remember is the abnormally strong winds during the month. Marcia organized a breakfast ride around the McGaheysville and Grottoes areas. By July, the Club's activity pace picked up. The month began in an exciting way with the World Cup Downhill races held at Massanutten. Many of the Club's members helped by being course marshals. Remember the whistle! Our annual summer picnic and monthly meeting began Hillandale Park at 5:30pm with a pre-meeting ride. By the time 6:30 arrived, a group of fourteen hungry picnickers descended Hillandale. The Club, once again, supplied ride leaders for the 6th Annual H/R Chamber's Bike Festival. We co-sponsored a second ride with the Valley Wellness Center. Two rides - 15 and 30 miles - started and ended at the Center. The pace further quickened in August due to the numerous Club sponsored rides: the Breakfast Ride, the Ice Cream Ride, the Keezletown rides, and time trials to name a few. September will be remembered for the Club's 15th Annual Century. Over 110 riders participated in the event - with no rain in sight. In October, daylight savings time ended, slowing most evening rides and ending the cycling season for others. Marcia planned a ride in conjunction with Massanutten's Autumn Peak Festival. After the ride, a few of us hiked the mountain and viewed the event(s). Later, we made our way to Tom Maver's house for potluck/cookout. November began the season of mountain biking.

Matt resigned his post of Secretary due to a job change (we will miss you at the meeting, Matt.). Also, the rains began to descend on the valley, or at least only on the weekends. In closing, we saw early signs of winter as the northern arctic winds picked up and snow flurries fell by mid-December. I hope that when you reflect on *your* 1997 season, your mind's eye will be seeing a

panoramic vision that includes many adventures and excitement.
