When I arrived one Tuesday evening, I quizzed the locals about the pace and course. I was happy with their answers - in a nutshell, a swift pace but not a strong pace. So off we went, 15 guys and three girls...pacing lining right out of the parking lot! (Like the Thursday

training rides in Keezletown.) After cycling 8 miles at a 24mph pace, I lost the wheel of the girl in front of me. And I really liked being there! Read between the lines....OK. Overall, I got dusted; but I met some new people. As I write this, I am planning to join the club for another fast-paced ride. Marq Lewis e-mailed me saying, "going fast can be a real hoot". During my last couple of outings, I have ridden, off and on, with eight We had great other cyclists. conversations, me finding out about them and their community and me telling them about the Shenandoah Valley and myself. All in all, each of my adventures turned out to be positive, fun, and enlightening, even thought they started out with the unknown. If you want to hear of more cycling adventures that started from knowing very little about an area, ask Marshall Hammond about his recent business trip to San Francisco. He has great mountain biking stories. Exploring. That is one of the things that life is about.

EARTH FORCE

Earth Force, a national non-profit youth organization, is launching a two-year national campaign by youth to make the U.S. more bike-friendly. The campaign, called "Get Out Spoke'n," is asking young people to set up community projects that will encourage bicycle riding as an environmentally sound form of transportation. CAR SHARING GAINS FOOTHOLD IN U.S.

Implemented with increasing success in cities and towns across Europe, car sharing clubs are now beginning to take off in the United States. In addition to an existing program in Portland, Oregon, efforts are underway in the San Francisco Bay Area to begin a club that would open its doors in mid-1999. As an alternative to the high cost of individual car ownership, car-sharers buy into a neighborhood fleet of vehicles that provide members with access to a range of cars depending upon need. Members call a reservation line to "check out" vehicles, and bills arrive at the end of each month with a time and mileage charge.

Car-sharing solves one of the crucial pricing distortions that locks people into over-reliance on car use, getting people out from under the fixed costs of private car ownership: purchase cost, insurance, and registration. Car-sharing turns these costs into variable costs based on mileage driven. Experienced car-sharing organizations report an average one-third reduction in driving by their members.
