ADVOCACY

Comprehensive Plan

On June 1, I met with Dick Keller, from the consulting firm Kellerco, who was hired to work on the transportation portion of Rockingham County's Comprehensive Plan. Aside from providing him with a list of county roads that most needed bike lanes (925, 257, 42, 659, 763/613, 33, Erickson Avenue, 689, 687, 704), I made a case against to the 506 Plan and for changing the County zoning laws in large residential subdivisions to allow some commercial establishments, such as corner grocery stores. The meeting went well. Once the public meetings on the Comprehensive Plan begin, it is the responsibility of County bicyclists to go and support the bicycling improvements that will be included. If you don't press for them, then they won't happen.

Beltway Mania

At the June 14 Harrisonburg City Council Meeting, I spoke against the 506 Plan. This plan, which contains some limited access sections, is the latest version of the HATS beltway proposed by VDOT. The reasons I oppose it include: (1) The limited access sections cannot be used by bicycles and also create a barrier that is difficult to cross. (2) The construction of any loop highway will result in both residential and commercial growth further from the center city, promoting further dependence on the automobile, bleeding businesses from the downtown area, and making it more difficult for utilitarian bicyclists to get to services. (3) The bottom line is that the money (VDOT isn't talking, but 506 could have a price tag of a quarter billion dollars by the time the smoke clears) can be better spent on a more balanced approach to transportation, including improving bicycling, walking, and mass transportation.

Another Bike Rack

I convinced the Kinkos on South Main Street to install a bicycle rack. Here's how to do this at big chains: (1) Talk to the manager (not a random lackey behind the counter) and make your case. (2) If that doesn't work, contact the regional manager. (3) If that doesn't work, keep climbing up the corporate food chain. Eventually, someone with adequate authority will either definitely tell you to take a hike, or (more likely) will authorize the modest expenditure of a bicycle rack.

A MEMORIAL EVENT TO REMEMBER

This was published in the "Open Forum" section of the Wednesday, May 30, 2001 Daily-News Record.

The helmets came off a little after 1 PM on Saturday, May 26. That's when Carisa, Joe Hiney's sister, announced the minute of silence in her brother's memory, her voice swelling with emotion. Over 160 bicyclists of all sizes, shapes, and ages removed their helmets and bowed their heads. Afterward, they streamed out of the parking lot of Turner Ashby High School for a 5-mile ride through Bridgewater, a memorial peloton, led by a Bridgewater Police Department cruiser. Almost all of the riders were wearing the yellow T-shirts that Carisa and Joe's widow, Teresa, handed out for free. The back of the shirts carried a large "smiley face," similar to the smaller one Joe had tattooed on his ankle. The tattoo was how the police identified his body on June 2, 2000.

On that day, while riding his bicycle on U.S. 33 near McGaheysville, about 1.5 miles from his home, Joseph P. Hiney was struck from behind and killed by an automobile. Taking all the necessary precautions to ensure his

safety -- riding with traffic, riding as far to the right as practical, and wearing a helmet - proved to be insufficient. The curb-hugging automobile just ran him down. To highlight our lopsided auto-friendly traffic laws, the driver was only found guilty of the anemic charge of "improper driving," a mere \$100 fine.

Although relatively rare, this type of auto/bike accident is one that many cyclists fear most. Outweighed and overpowered, cyclists are at the mercy of any motor vehicle that overtakes them from behind. While the Virginia driver's manual states, "Bicycles are considered vehicles and have the same rights-of-way as motor vehicles," it would appear that we use those rights-of-way at our own peril. Rights on paper alone are no rights at all.

For this reason, it is imperative that roads have accommodations for bicyclists, especially heavily traveled, high-speed roads like U.S. 33. Our area is woefully inadequate in this regard. Due to current Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) policy, VDOT will not pass out funds for bicycle improvements (and there are such funds available) unless our local governments ask for them. It is therefore up to all cyclists to contact their elected officials regarding necessary bicycle improvements; they can't read our minds.

Bicycling is often an individual pursuit, and consequently bicyclists are often a confused and divergent lot with regards to lobbying for fair treatment from local and state agencies. But on that beautiful day in May, there seemed to be some hope, when the 160+ bicyclists in yellow paid tribute to the late Joe Hiney, husband, brother, bicyclist, and teacher. Some of the participants were his students, some his friends, some his family, and some fellow cyclists. They were brought together to remember Joe and to make a statement for positive change. The Joe Hiney Memorial Ride illustrated the best the Valley has to offer, and I was proud to be a part of it.

TIDBITS

Allen Turnbull, Executive Director of BikeWalk Virginia has announced an opportunity for Virginia Health and PE Teachers to be trained in bicycle education this summer.

The summer institute will held July 16-19 at James Madison University in Harrisonburg, Virginia. Housing and food will be in the new air-conditioned east campus facilities. The new League of American Bicyclists (LAB) Bike Education curriculum will be used.

A 402 federal highway safety grant from the Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to BikeWalk Virginia will pay for the LAB trainers, instructional materials, and the Basics of Bicycling school curriculum package that all attendees will receive at the conclusion of the training. All teachers will also receive a certificate for having completed the Bike Smart Virginia Bike Education Teacher Training.

The cost is \$35 registration (materials and workshops), \$135 food and lodging fee (includes all meals, lodging and linens (two to a room, each pays \$135). For commuters there is a \$55 meal ticket. A single room is available for an additional \$40.

Mike Klasmeier and Anthony Yoder of LAB will tech the workshop with assistance from Virginia Effective Cycling Instructors, Allen Muchnick and Penelope DeBlasio will work with Mike and Anthony to structure the training and coordinate all phases of the actual workshop delivery. Other Virginia ECI may want to participate. LAB will bring all of the training materials - workbooks, handouts, videos, etc. The JMU classroom has state-of-the-art audiovisual /computer equipment.

The Blacks Run Greenway Partnership will be making a presentation at the city council meeting next Tuesday, June 26, near the start of the meeting at 7:30. We encourage as many members of SVBC to attend as are able. Part of the presentation will list the many partners involved in this undertaking and will likely ask that all in the audience who are part of those groups supporting the plan either stand or raise hands to indicate support.

Although the Blacks Run Greenway will be much more than just a bike path, this primary connector is envisioned as a paved, shared-use, off-street bike path from Massanutten Vo-Tech on Pleasant Valley Rd, following the Blacks Run corridor for the most part through the city as far as the Eastern Mennonite Retirement Community. It will connect many of the city's schools, recreation facilities, and apartment areas. The initial segment will likely connect Purcell Park to the Ramblewood athletic fields. It will eventually provide a much more pleasant alternative for bike commuters than Main Street and provide a safe route for youth to/from schools and parks.

THE MINI-MAMA RIDE

Cloudy skies, high winds, and unseasonably cool temperatures would not deter eleven brave Club members from venturing to Highland County for the 2nd Annual Mini-Mama training ride. The underdressed needed only to dig into Marshall's bottomless dufflebag for shirts, jackets, tights and even booties!
