JULY MEETING MINUTES

The July SVBC meeting was held at Luigi's Rt. 42S on July 10th at 7:30 P.M. President Ben Wyse called the meeting to order. There were 11 members present. The treasurer reported a balance of \$4417.14.

Marcia presented the 2005 expenses so a financial committee of members could decide the direction the club. A copy of these expenses is available in the club newsletter archive and through the web site along with the minutes. This committee consists of Marcia, Marshall, Art, Ben, and Robert and will meet to discuss the financial direction of the club. A report will be made following the meeting.

Neups reiterated his call for a newsletter editor as David will give up the job at the end of 2006. Neups would like to work with the new editor to ensure a smooth transition. The club has published a newsletter since the 1980's and all in attendance feel it is a worth while endeavor that needs to be continued. Please contact Neups if interested. Additionally the club needs someone to coordinate the twice yearly trash pick up along Amberly Road in Rockingham County. 100 CENTURIES

A few years back I thought about tracking my century rides. I've been tracking my mileage for a while now, and since I still had my log books, it was just a matter of making time to pull out the century information.

Well, I got it together and now record a good bit of information on my century rides. On July 4th I completed my 100th century, so I thought I'd reminisce about them.

My first century took place while in college, September 1979, and was the Pocono Century Tour. That one hurt – I just didn't really know how to ride long distances. And it took me just over ten hours to complete. I didn't do another century for two years. It was the same one, but this time only took eight hours. The following year I did my first century with full packs as I rode across the country. We woke up with one of our only tailwinds the whole trip (we were riding east to west) because of a brewing storm and we did over sixty miles before stopping for some lunch.

My first and second solo centuries (#5 & #6) occurred in August 1989 only three days apart while on another tour, this time down the Skyline and Parkway and into the Great Smokey Mountains. In all I've done 31 solo centuries, with 19 of those occurring in the last four years. I've done 31 centuries in the last four years, so 61% of these have been solo.

My century career really kicked into high gear once I had my first really decent road bike. In 1994 I got my Serotta. Since then I've done 90 centuries. Fifty-six of my 100 centuries have been on that Serotta, which I still ride. The Trek 5500 that I bought in 2002 has 31 of my centuries on its wheels.

It wasn't until 1996's Waynesboro century (my #21) that I achieved my first sub-five hour century. We had a good group that worked well together. The year before I had fallen at mile 20 and flatted at mile 40 of that same century, so I really enjoyed this ride. Maybe I rode so well because I rode the tough Mt. Mitchell century (my #20) in May that year with Al Clague.

I've been able to ride other tough centuries – with Cycle America while touring Yellowstone and the Tetons (#28 & #29) in 1999, Mountain Mama several times starting in 2000 (#37, #63, and #73), with Pedal the Peaks and my brother John in 2001 (#41 and #42), Bridge to Bridge in 2002 with Al and torrential rain (#68), and Mountains of Misery with Larry Kelley and Joe Urbanski in 2003 (#69).

I've also done a couple of double centuries and some other longer-than-centuries rides. My first double (#33/#34) was in June 2000 as I rode back towards my parents' home in Pennsylvania under a hot sun. I did another in 2002 (#57/#58), this one with leg/knee pain. Both were solo efforts. I rode 180 miles solo in 2003 (#70) to my friend's house outside Harrisburg, PA. In April 2004 I did a solo training ride of 120 miles (#77) to prepare for a randonneur ride of 188 miles (#79) with my brother John in Frederick, MD that we did in May, getting back just before the really bad thunderstorms hit. Last year I did three longer rides, all solo. The first (#82) was down Route 42 to Goshen, through the pass, and back. The next (#83) was more brutal than expected as I rode to Mathias, WV, then through Lost River State Park. I made it to Brandywine with no water to spare that day. Both these rides were 117 miles. The third (#87) was a ride to Greencastle, PA of 122 miles.

The most centuries I've done in one year is fifteen, back in 2002. This year my goal is twenty. The July 4th century was my 11th this year. Since then I've done my 101st century by tackling the Blue Ridge Extreme course with Len Clymer. And I'll be out there on most Saturdays trying to reach my goal for this year and to work towards my 200th century. If you see me, don't forget to wave.

24th Annual Shenandoah Valley Century

Sunday, September 10, 2006

Bicycle rides of 25, 50, or 100 miles through
the scenic and historic Shenandoah Valley of Virginia

Sponsored by the Shenandoah Valley Bicycle Club

The Shenandoah Valley Century is a special bicycling event sponsored in conjunction with a number of bicycling organizations nationwide that are offering similar rides during September. The term "century" refers to the longest ride being 100 miles (a century of miles). Century rides originated in the late 1800's. Cyclists would attempt to ride 100 miles in under 10 hours. Now, rides of various lengths are offered to suit all abilities with no time limits set.

We invite you to join us and others on the SHENANDOAH VALLEY CENTURY for some of the finest cycling to be found. Scenic vistas, small towns, beautiful farms, quiet roads, and more. All routes are paved and have low traffic volume. Participants ride at their own pace; the event is not a race. Maps are provided and the route will be patrolled by automobile sag to provide assistance as needed. A food and drink stop is provided every 25 miles and at the midpoint of the 25 mile ride. At the end of the ride, bicyclists are treated to a variety of baked goods donated by the Shenandoah Valley Bicycle Club members.

To avoid delays in waiting for the sag, be prepare to fix minor repairs yourself, e.g. a flat tire.

TIME: 100 mile ride: registration 7am; start 8am
25 & 50 miles: registration 8:15 am; start 9am

PLACE: Hillendale Park shelter #11
Hillendale Avenue
Harrisonburg, VA

COST: Individual \$9.50 pre-registration (see registration form)
Family \$24 (3 or more family members)

Registration includes route map, marked route, route patrol, mechanical help, food and water stops during the ride, and after ride treats. Massages and patches from the League of American Bicyclists (a national bicycling organization) will be available after the ride for a nominal fee. **ASTM, CPSC OR SNELL APPROVED HELMETS ARE REQUIRED.**

Harrisonburg is easily reached from the north or south via I-81. Hillendale Avenue is off Route 42 (South High Street) on the western side of the city. Parking in Hillendale may be limited. Additional parking is available at the nearby Food Lion and other locations.

6. In case of cancellation due to means beyond our control, a full refund cannot be guaranteed.

I thus release the above organizations and their officers, employees, and members and agree to absolve and hold them harmless from any and all liabilities arising from my having sustained any property damage or personal injury by reason of their negligence in participating, sponsoring, planning, or arranging this event. I shall abide by all traffic laws and practice courtesy and safety in bicycling. I shall wear a CPSC, ASTM F1447 or SNELL approved helmet.
