# Shenandoah Valley Century

On Sunday, September 18, the SVBC will sponsor its first (hopefully of many) national century. It is called this since the League of American Wheelmen sets September as National Century Month. During the month, organizations all around the country will carry out such rides. On the tour here you will have the choice of a full century (100 miles), a half, or a quarter century. All riders set their own pace.

Those opting for the 100 mile loop will leave in a mass start at 8:00 AM, with registration starting an hour earlier. Registration for the 25 and 50 mile tours will begin at 9:00 AM with a mass start at 10:00. Those who wish to leave before 10:00 may do so, however the benefit of the mass start is so that you can meet and ride with others doing the same pace.

To assist you on the route, maps are provided, roads are marked, and checkpoints with liquid and solid refreshments will pop up about every 25 miles. And of course a sagwagon will be on the route to help you with any problems, mechanical or otherwise. Sandwiches and other foods will be available at the finish.

The tour will start and finish at the National Guard Armory. There will be floor space available for sleeping bags the night before at the token fee of \$1. If you have friends from out of town who would like to ride, but don't have room for them, you can suggest this to them.

Preregistration forms can be obtained at any of the 3 bike shops in town. Cost for the tour is \$4.00 if registered before Sept. 17, and \$5.00 after. Also, there is a rate of \$12.00 for families (immediate).

As mentioned at the July meeting, volunteers are needed to run checkpoints, assist at registration, and help with various tasks before the ride. Also, we would like to borrow some large (5 gallon or so) water coolers. If you could help us out with any of the above, call Art Fovargue at 433-9247. Also, the next meeting (Aug. 17) of the Century Committee is open to all, and so if you would like to come, call Art for further info.

P.S. We need every SVBC member to bake a batch of cookies, brownies, munchies, or other delectable edibles to help feed the hungry bikers at the end of the Shenandoah Valley Century. By asking every member, to make an edible donation, we: (1) keep the cost of the ride down; and (2), more importantly, add a special touch to the event that will hopefully encourage folks to return for next year's event, and maybe bring a friend or two! Please bring those delicious goodies to the armory on Sunday, Sept. 18 by 11 AM, or drop them by the Phillips' (527 Collicello, H-burg) on Sat. Sept 17 (John, Debby and Beth promise they will not eat any until Sunday!). The SVBC needs member support to make this a successful event.

Don't neglect those evening rides on the schedule led by Art Forague. They are an excellent opportunity to ride for both the novice and the veteran bicyclists. The rides are short (10-15 mi.), stops are frequent, and you will discover some routes close to town that you may not have known about. An evening ride - a pleasure not to be missed.
