### **September Meeting Minutes**

Larry Hakel of the Shenandoah National Park Service spoke on bicycling in the park. Several interesting statistics were given. For instance, 700,000 cars use the park each year along with 10,000 bicyclists. The idea of special bike lanes was brought up, but Mr Hakel explained that to widen the road to include bike lanes would require extensive excavation due to the fact that the park roads are so narrow. This excavation goes against the number one park mandate which is to preserve the park ecology and to keep it as undamaged as possible. So, while the end result of a 3 foot bike lane on each side of the road may not seem to damaging, the means to that end would result in quite a bit of destruction to the road sides. Mr. Hakel also described an ongoing study for opening certain park maintenance roads to bikers. Currently, only the paved roads are open to bikes. He told us that the park is considering having some sort of special bike day on the park where part of the park would be closed to automobile traffic.

Art gave a preliminary Century report praising participants and volunteers. He even managed to sell half of the leftover T-shirts! Garth Kunkle and Brian Bowers set a new century record at 5 hours and 16 minutes.

Trash pickup day on October 17 th was discussed.

#### **BICYCLE PARKING**

As slight as the public pressure for bicycle parking may be, the problem of securing a bicycle in a safe and convenient way is real and is shared by every individual bicyclist. A well thought out and effectively executed bicycle parking program which appeals to both the implementors and the users is the answer to reducing bicycle theft and is a positive factor in encouraging bicycle use.

In keeping with that thought we are sharing with you this Bicycle Parking Coupon taken from the Chicagoland Bicycle Federation newsletter. The Federation has a Business Bicycle Parking Packet they distribute. You can reach them at PO Box 64396, Chicago, IL 68664 or call 312-42-PEDAL. If you get a recording punch 7. We also suggest consulting the advocacy section of The Cyclists' Yellow Pages for sources of information on bicycle parking. Below are some suggested uses for the coupon:

- Pass out at club meetings for members to use around the community.
- Print it in your newsletter: the coupon can be clipped out, copied by members and mailed or dropped off at local businesses.
- Make copies available to your Bicycle Coordinator or Bicycle Advisory Committee.
- Let your local Business Association know that the coupons will be in circulation; give them a copy of Tech Note #P1: Bike Parking Location (see Club Handbook)
- Distribute copies to bicycle shops.
